A Powhiri was held to welcome our new students and staff to Tamatea High School.


























ようこそ(**Youkoso) - Welcome!** Our new International students, all from Japan were also welcomed at the Pōwhiri.

Tuakana training takes place at the start of the year. Some our Year 12 and 13 students step up and help our new Year 9 students to settle in and transition to high school.


Our Tuakana then transfer their newly found skills to working with teina, having fun while getting to know them.





Emily: "Going to forum was an amazing opportunity. Going into it, I wasn't exactly sure what to expect, but every single lecture or module we attended was fascinating, from heart dissections, to lasers and robots. There was such a variety and it expanded not only my knowledge of the different areas in STEM, but also opened my eyes in terms of the career I want to pursue.

As well as this, it was the people who made my experience what it was. I would have never thought that the 167 nerds that I met would give me so many good moments and memories to look back on.

RNSTF gave me the confidence in myself to apply for an International Science Forum in London, which accepts only 500 students from 80 countries. It offers lectures and modules from world leading scientists, a Nobel prize winner and visits to University of Cambridge, Oxford as well as top research centres. I am so lucky to have been chosen to attend this forum in London! Thank you to Greenmeadows Rotary for opening the door to these opportunities."

Tamatea High School Reunion Update

- In 2024, the school decided to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the school in 2025 with a reunion, selecting Easter 2025 as a potential date
- In November 2024 the school was informed of roof replacements which included asbestos removal which meant that Easter 2025 was no longer an option for a celebration; King's Birthday Weekend was then explored as being a better option
- In early 2025, a small group of former students who expressed interest in organising the reunion, reviewed the situation and agreed that King's Birthday Weekend date did not give enough time to coordinate a well-organised celebration. They recommended the date be set at Hawke's Bay Anniversary/Labour Weekend Friday 24 Sunday 26 October 2025. While this is yet another date change, the longer timeframe would be better for those organizing and for those attending.
- The Reunion Committee currently consists of former students: Aroha Cooper, Sharon Jansen, Caren Rangi, Devon Turi, Michelle Johansson, Luke Harris and Carmen Tuhua. They are looking to recruit more members. Spokesperson Sharon Jansen notes that "we are very excited about the opportunity to reconnect with former classmates and teachers, while also showcasing Tamatea High School 50 years on from its establishment".

Mohi Bush Trip

This week the Japanese students and their buddies went for a trip to some special places in the region. First up we went to the top of Te Mata Peak, to get the best view. We learnt the legend of the sleeping giant as well as looking at Kahuranaki and the rest of Te Matua a Maui.

From there we went to our main destination, Mohi Bush. This reserve is a pristine example of pre-human rainforest, tucked away up Maraetotara Road. Walking along the track, we were able to see examples of many Aotearoa native plants, including punga, kawakawa and kohuhu/pittosporum. The most impressive, however, was the dreaded ongaonga, which grew in some quite large clumps that we carefully avoided.

After our walk, we stopped at Maraetotara Falls. We drove to Mataruahou, just in time to see a pair of cargo ships swapping places in the port.
