### STEM workshops with Waikato University

A range of STEM workshops were presented by the University of Waikato in order to encourage possible scientific and digital career paths. Senior students participated in workshops related to engineering, biomedical science, and digital technology. Our tauira were introduced to a breadth of information that can only be obtained from a post-secondary institution. From sophisticated web design and programming to studying the atomic structure of metals using a \$90,000 electron microscope and, gaining deeper understanding of the quaternary architecture of lethal viruses. It goes without saying, that our tauira were extremely fortunate to have access to equipment that is beyond the means of a high school. Students departed with a more favourable view of the opportunities a STEM career pathway could possibly provide.



They started at the Whakamaharatanga Walkway, which crosses farmland and two ancient pā sites, featuring terraces, pits, and middens (shell dumps). Notably, much of this farmland was submerged prior to the Hawke's Bay earthquake in 1931. It's regrettable that due to poor weather, not all of our Year 9s could participate in this experience this term.

Lastly, we are sad to say farewell to Luke Russell, who joined us as a student teacher in Term 3, 2022, and quickly proved himself as an asset to our kura. He seamlessly transitioned from teaching Year 10 Science to Health and P.E in 2024. Luke has been an exceptional rugby coach for our Ahuriri team. His ability to think on his feet and build strong relationships with staff and students will be greatly missed. We wish him all the best for his rugby career in Ireland.




























# Miharo Matariki
