Ka whiti te Mārama, which means 'The light shone clear,' has just been printed. It was written by Toni MacKinnon, Art Curator at MTG Hawke's Bay.

The book is an extended version of an exhibition of the same name, currently at MTG Hawke's Bay Tai Ahuriri. Each of the art works has been chosen for the fact that they reveal something about our history - from before Pākehā arrived, to more contemporary times. In that sense, the book is historically interesting as well as a visual feast.

Commentary and poems by students from two local schools, Lindisfarne College and Tamatea High School, have been incorporated into the book.

Creative New Zealand funded the publication (with a contribution from Hawke's Bay Museums Trust) on the basis that the book was sent free to all schools in Hawke's Bay. The book is a relevant and valid source for students in understanding different perspectives on our past and schools can use it as a resource for learning about Aotearoa's history.
