This week is Te Wiki o te Reo Māori (Māori Language Week), and this year's theme revolves around Ake Ake Ake – A Forever Language. During World War II, the 28th Māori Battalion marched into Europe singing "Ake! Ake! Kia Kaha e!" These days, the words Ake Ake Ake often conclude karakia and speeches. This repeated kupu is a fitting concept to promote our aspirations for Te Reo, a living language, a taonga for now and Ake Ake Ake!



So this week and beyond, try out some *kupu hou* (new words), some new phrases, put yourself out there, and kōrero Te Reo Māori. Kia māhorahora te reo – let's make it seen, let's make it heard.

Our senior students and Year 10s have recently completed the final round of Common Assessment Activities (Exams) for Literacy and Numeracy for 2024. These are relatively new exams, and I had the opportunity to speak with a few students afterwards. Their reactions varied: some were relieved to have finished, others felt successful, while a few were disappointed. It's important to remember that there is no set year in which students must complete these qualifications. We are committed to supporting our students in achieving their Literacy and Numeracy goals, and those who didn't succeed this year should be encouraged. With hard work, focus, and support from their kaiako (teachers), they can achieve this in 2025.

I'd like to highlight two important actions as we near the end of this term. First up is subject selection. The second action is Hui Whāinga, which ties in perfectly with subject selection. This is a fantastic opportunity for whānau to connect with their student's whānau group tutor.
